**Bramley** is a village and township, in the parish of Braithwell, and union and county court district of Rotherham. The living is a chapelry, endowed with the rectorial tithes, and annexed to the rectory of Braithwell: the tithes were commuted in 1841 for £269 per annum. Here is a village school, and a small Wesleyan chapel, in which the celebrated John Wesley preached in 1786. The population in 1861 was 335; area, 984 acres.

**BRAMHAM** is a parish and pleasant village, on the Great North road: it includes the township of BRAMHAM-OPM-OGLETHORPE, 4 miles west-south-west from Tadcaster, 4 south-south-east from Wetherby (its nearest market town), 3 south from Thorpe Arch railway station, 2 south from Boston Spa, 12 south-south-east from Harrogate, and 11 from Leeds; it is in the Southern division of the Riding, Tadcaster union and county court district, upper division of Barkston Ash wapentake, Tadcaster rural deanery, and York archdeaconry and diocese. The church of All Saints is an elegant stone building, partly Decorated Early English and partly Norman: it was restored in 1853-4, at a cost of about £1,150, raised principally by subscription: it has nave, north and south aisles, chancel, south porch, square embattled tower surmounted by a small spire containing a clock and 3 bells: there are several handsome marble tablets to the memory of the families of Fox and Bingley. The churchyard is very extensive. The register dates from 1586. The living is a discharged vicarage, annual value £300, with good residence and 80 acres of glebe land, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, to whom the great tithes were given by Henry VIII.; the Rev. William Salmon Mare, M.A. of Magdalen College, Cambridge, is vicar. There is a Parochial school for boys and girls, endowed with £20 per annum, and also a Sunday school. Here are chapels for Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists. The poor of the parish have the interest of £62 5s. 8d. given away in bread. Bramham Moor occupies a high plain, and extends near to and towards the village of Aberford. There are many vestiges of the great Roman road called Watling Street, from which consular road came divers others, viz., Vicinales, by Thorner and Shadwell, through Street-lane and Hawcaster Rig to Addle. Some ancient brass instruments have been found here. On this moor, in 1408, the Earl of Northumberland and his forces were defeated by Sir Thomas Rokeby, sheriff of Yorkshire, thereby helping to secure the crown to Henry IV. Bramham Park is the property of G. L. Fox, Esq.; the mansion was nearly all burnt down, with its costly furniture, on the 29th of July, 1828, and has not yet been restored: the park is adorned with temples, &c., as well as by a large obelisk, erected in memory of Robert Fox Lane, Esq., grandson and heir to Robert Benson, Lord Bingley, who died in 1768: in the chapel adjoining the ruins are some marble monuments to the ancestors of the family: Bramham Park was granted by William and Mary to the father of the first Lord

Bingley, who enclosed it, and commenced the plantations. G. L. Fox, Esq., keeps a pack of foxhounds and a stud of hunters at the park. Bowcliffe House, which stands on an eminence, the seat of George Lane Fox, Esq., J.P., is a good mansion in the Grecian style, comprising a centre and two wings, the entrance being surmounted by a pediment, supported by six pillars: the grounds are very tastefully laid out. Hope Hall is the sporting seat of Viscount Nevill: it stands in small but neatly laid-out pleasure grounds. Oglethorpe Hall, now a farm-house, in the occupation of Mr. Charles Wright, is about a mile east from Bramham; this place was formerly the residence of the ancient family of Oglethorpe, one of whom was reeve of the county at the time of the Norman Conquest: they continued here until the civil wars, when their estates were lost for their loyalty. Bramham College is a scholastic institution, occupying a mansion formerly known by the name of Bramham Biggin, and once the residence of Sir George Allanson Winn, Bart., who, in the year 1797, was created the first Lord Headley, in the peerage of Ireland: about the year 1843 the Rev. Benjamin Bentley Haigh, who had for several years occupied Griston Lodge, near Tadcaster, as an educational establishment, took Bramham Biggin on lease, and transferred his establishment thither; since then Mr. Haigh has expended large sums in enlarging and improving the house and grounds: at the entrance gateway there is a rustic lodge. The original style of the house was Tudor; the principal front exhibits a centre with two wings, 170 feet in length: the new building consists of a hall, 60 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 24 feet high, cloisters, gymnasium, &c.: the refectory is a magnificent apartment in the Grecian style, 60 feet long, 35 feet wide, and 22 feet high: the decorations of this room are exceedingly elegant: the college, house and premises are well lighted with gas. The park, gardens, &c., extend over 130 acres. There is an excellent library attached to the college, to which the pupils have access. Divine service, with a lecture by the principal, the Rev. R. B. Haigh, is held every Sunday evening in the hall of the college. F. C. T. Gascoigne, Esq., is lord of the manor; George Lane Fox, Esq., Lord Headley, and the Rev. B. Eamson are the principal landowners. The soil is light loam; subsoil, magnesian limestone and freestone. The chief crops are turnips, barley, wheat, and oats. The population of the township in 1861 was 1,331, and the area 3,971A. 0R. 16P. The population of the entire parish is 3,434, and the area 5,462 acres.

BRAMHOPE is a township and village in the parish of Otley, 3½ miles south-east from Otley, in the Northern division of the Riding, upper division of the wapentake of Sky-rack, Wharfedale union, Otley county court district and rural deanery, Craven archdeaconry, Ripon diocese, and province of York. The church is a plain stone building, with small belfry and 1 bell. The living is a donative, annual value £48, in the gift of trustees, and held by the Rev. William John Ridsdale, B.A., of St. Catherine's College, Cambridge. There is a Church day and Sunday school for

boys and girls. The Wesleyans have a place of worship and a Sunday school. Miss Dawson and William Rhodes, Esq., are the principal landowners; the former possesses the manorial rights. The soil is sandy, and in parts clayey; the subsoil is rock. The chief crops are wheat, barley, and potatoes. The population in 1861 was 312, and the area is 1,290 acres.

BRAMLEY is a township, chapelry, extensive clothing village, and station on the Great Northern line of railway, about one mile in length, 3½ miles west-by-north from Leeds, in the Northern division of the Riding, borough of Leeds, Hunslet union, Leeds county court district, wapentake of Morley, honour of Pontefract, diocese of Ripon, archdeaconry of Craven, and rural deanery of Leeds: it stands on a bold swelling eminence, on the south side of Airedale, and includes part of STANNINGLEY, RODLEY, KIRKSTALL BRIDGE, BRAMLEY FALL, and the hamlets of NEWLAY, WHITECOTE, and HOUGHEND. The church of St. Peter (erected in 1863, near to the site of the ancient edifice, dedicated to St. Margaret), is a handsome and spacious stone building in the Geometric Gothic style: it consists of nave, chancel,

tower with spire: it has two handsome stained glass windows, and a very fine peal of bells: the clock has four illuminated dials, each six feet in diameter. The register dates from 1717. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £280, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Leeds, and held by the Rev. John Gott, M.A., of Brasenose College, Oxford. The National school was built in 1850, at the cost of £1,100. Here are commodious chapels belonging to the Baptists, Wesleyans, and Primitive Methodists and United Methodists' Free Church. Earl Cardigan is lord of the manor and principal landowner. Bramley Fall is noted for its quarries of excellent stone. The soil is clay and loam; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat and oats. The township and chapelry contains 2,331 acres, and the population in 1861 was 8,690.

with pinnacles at the west end, containing 3 bells: this church, originally cruciform, with a tower at the intersection of the limbs, has undergone repeated alterations, and all that can be said with certainty to belong to the earlier structure is the circular arch over the principal entrance; whatever brasses it may have once contained have been destroyed or removed: within the communion rails is a mutilated inscription, with the arms of the Sheffields (a fess between 6 sheaves of corn), "Hic jacet . . . Thomas Sch-feld . . . qui obiit . . . MCCCCVI," engraved on a scroll encircling the head of an elegant cross florée: there are other inscriptions to Thomas Bosvile (1631), Nathaniel Eyre (1663), John Gleadall (1688) and John Turner (1766): the pulpit and reading-desk are of carved oak; on the former, carved in old English characters, are three texts, with the date 1574: in the chancel, remains what is called the "Founder's tomb," a monument of unusually large dimensions, and near it a piscina; there is no stained glass, and the font is modern. In the centre of the village is an ancient cross, dated MCXCI, with an inscription which Dr. Pegge read:—

"Jesu le fiz Marie  
Pense toy  
Le frere no roy  
Je vous prie."

The register dates from the year 1559, and is in fairly good condition. The living is a rectory, yearly value £380 with good residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor and held by the Rev. Christopher Hodgson, of St. Bees. There are chapels for Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists. The poor have several small benefactions amounting to £34 yearly. Stockings are made here. Lord Conyers is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are the Earl of Scar-

borough, J. Waterhouse and J. Fisher esqrs. The soil is clay and loam; the subsoil is limestone. The chief crops are wheat, barley and beans. BRAMHAM is a pleasant village, on the Great North road, and a parish which includes the township of BRAMHAM-CUM-OGLETHORPE and CLIFFORD-CUM-BOSTON, which latter will be found under a separate head: the village is 4 miles west-south-west from Tadcaster, 4 south-south-east from Wetherby, 2 south from Boston Spa, 12 south-south-east from Harrogate and 11 from Leeds; the nearest Railway stations are Newton Kyme for York 2½ miles north-east, Thorner for Leeds 4 miles west, and Thorp Arch for Wetherby 3 miles south: Bramham is a polling place for the Eastern division of the Riding, in Wetherby union, Tadcaster county court district, upper division of Barkstone Ash wapentake, Selby rural deanery and York archdeaconry and diocese. The church of All Saints is a stone edifice, in the Norman and Early English styles, and was restored in 1853-4 at a cost of about £1,150, raised principally by subscription; subsequently, in 1866, a sum of nearly £400 was expended on the repair of the chancel: in 1874 the tower was damaged by fire, and on this and other accounts, a more extensive restoration was undertaken, including a new vestry and the addition of six bells and a clock, at a total cost of nearly £5,000: the church now consists of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, vestry and square embattled tower, surmounted by a small spire; and will seat 300: it contains a number of fine memorial stained windows; the east window was erected in 1379 to Mrs. Katherine Mary Fox by her husband, and there are others in the chancel to Elizabeth Ivan, wife of Henry Thynne Lascelles (1834) and to the Hon. Haigh LL.D. principal of Bramham College (1869); Stephen Wilson, 30 years assistant master of the same (1876); Lady Boyle; William Augustine Robinson (1858), erected by Eliza his wife; and to William Gadsby, an old servant of the Harewood family: in the north aisle is a memorial window to John Gregson and his wife, erected by their son, Francis Robert Gregson (1870): there are also various tablets and brasses; one brass in the south aisle is inscribed to Henry Lane Fox, son of George Lane Fox of Bramham (1816-76); another, outside the communion rails to the Rev. Robert Bownas, mentioned above; other and similar memorials relate to the Hon. Edwin Lascelles, William Sebright Lascelles, Harriet Fenwick Lascelles; to Charlotte, daughter of the Hon. John and Lady Frances Douglas, Fairfax Fearby, of the Middle Temple, barrister at law (1791), and to the family of Poppelwell from 1779; a redos of exquisite workmanship has been erected to the memory of Henry Lane Fox: the six bells are variously dated; the first, an ancient bell, is undated; the second was cast in 1661 and bears the inscription "Soli Deo gloria, pax Hominibus;" a third is dated 1778. The register dates from 1586 and is in a good state of preservation. The living is a discharged vicarage, yearly value £340, with good residence and 71 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, to whom the great tithes were given by Henry VIII.; the Rev. William Salmon Mare M.A. of Magdalene College, Cambridge, is vicar. There is a Parochial school for boys and girls, supported by annual subscriptions amounting to about £70, a government grant,

and the children's pence; there is also a Sunday school. Here are chapels for Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists. The poor of the parish have bread to the amount of £5 10s. a year, distributed quarterly, from the interest of money left some years since; there are also other charities valued at £14 yearly. Bramham Moor, occupying a high plain and extending near to the village of Aberford, exhibits large remains of the Great Roman road called Watling Street, from which consular road came divers *via vicinales*, by Thorner and Shadwell, through Street lane and Hawcaster Rig, or Harwood Moor, to Addle: some ancient brass instruments have been found here. On this moor, in 1408, the Earl of Northumberland and his forces were defeated by Sir Thomas Rokeby, sheriff of Yorkshire, thereby helping to secure the crown to Henry IV. Bramham Park, granted by Queen Anne to Benson, first lord Bingley, and now the property of G. L. Fox esq. is adorned with several buildings in the Classic style and has a large obelisk, erected in memory of Robert Fox Lane esq. grandson and heir to Robert Benson, Lord Bingley, who died in 1768; in the chapel adjoining the ruins of the mansion, almost entirely consumed by fire on the 29th June, 1828, are some marble monuments to the ancestors of the family; G. Bramham College is a scholastic institution, occupying a mansion known as Bramham Biggin, formerly occupied by the first Lord Headley: its adaption as a school dating from about the year 1843, when the Rev. BRAMHOPE is a township and village in the parish of Otley, 3½ miles south-east from Otley and 1 mile south from the Pool station, in the Eastern division of the Riding, upper division of the wapentake of Skyrack, Wharfedale union, Otley county court district, rural deanery of Otley, archdeaconry of Craven and diocese of Ripon. The North Eastern railway from Harrogate to Leeds passes under Bramhope moor by a tunnel which is 2 miles and 1 furlong long. The old church or chapel-of-ease is a plain stone building with small belfry and 1 bell, probably erected in the Commonwealth period: the font dates from 1673: there are monuments in the church to the Rev. **BRAMHAM-CUM-OGLETHORPE** is a parish, township and pleasant village on the Great North road, 4 miles west-south-west from Tadcaster, 4 south-south-east from Wetherby, 12 south-south-east from Harrogate and 12 from Leeds; the nearest stations being Newton Kyme, 2½ miles north-east, for York, Thorne, 4 miles west, for Leeds, and Thorp Arch, 3 miles south, for Wetherby, all on the York, Wetherby and Leeds section of the North Eastern railway. Bramham is in the Barkston Ash division of the Riding, upper division of Barkston Ash wapentake, Wetherby petty sessional division and union, Tadcaster county court district, rural deanery of Selby and archdeaconry and diocese of York. The parish is supplied with gas by a company formed in 1869. The church of All Saints is an edifice of stone in the Norman and Early English styles, and was restored in 1853-4 at a cost of about £1,150, raised principally by subscription, and in 1866 a sum of nearly £400 was expended on the repair of the chancel: in 1874 the tower was damaged by fire, and on this and other accounts, a more extensive restoration was undertaken, including a new vestry and the addition of a clock and 6 new bells, at a total cost of nearly £4,000: the church now consists of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, vestry, and an embattled western tower with a small spire: the stained east window was erected in 1879 by her husband as a memorial to Mrs. Katherine Mary Fox, and in the chancel are four memorial windows to the Rev. W. S. Mars, for many years vicar of this parish: in the south aisle are others to Henry Lane-Fox, Royal Horse Guards, placed by his brother officers (1880); George Lane-Fox esq. J.P., D.L. for over 40 years master of the Bramham Moor Hunt; Mary Ann Bownas, daughter of the Rev. Robert Bownas, a former vicar (1795-1819); B. B. Heigh LL.D. principal of Bramham College (1869); Stephen Wilson, 30 years assistant master of the same (1876) and to Lady Boyle: in the north aisle is a memorial window to John Gregson and his wife, erected in 1870: there are also brasses to Henry Lane-Fox, son of George Lane-Fox esq. of Bramham (1846-76), and to the Rev. Robert Bownas, mentioned above: a reredos of exquisite workmanship has been erected to the memory of Henry Lane-Fox: there are 300 sittings. The register dates from 1586 and is in a good state of preservation. The living is a discharged vicarage, net yearly value £244, including 68 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1898 by the Rev. Edward Gustavus Wadson M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge; the great tithes, amounting to £900, were appropriated by Henry VIII. to the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, and a Primitive Methodist chapel, erected in 1826. The poor of the parish have distributed to them 6 loaves of bread weekly to the amount of £5 10s. a year, being the interest of money left some years since; there are also other charities valued at £14 yearly. Bramham Moor, occupying a high plain and extending near to the village of Aberford, exhibits large remains of the great Roman consular road called "Watling Street," branching from which are divers viæ vicinales, proceeding by Thorne

and Shadwell, through Street lane and Hawcaster Rig, or Harwood Moor, to Adel: some ancient brass instruments have been found here. On this moor, 29th Feb. 1407-8, Henry (Percy), Earl of Northumberland and his forces, in arms against Henry IV. were defeated by the royal troops under Sir Thomas Rokeby, sheriff of Yorkshire, when the Earl was slain, and his chief associate, Lord Bardolf, mortally wounded. **Bramham Park**, granted by Queen Anne to Robert (Benson), first and only baron Bingley of that name, and now the property of James Thomas Richard Lane-Fox esq. D.L., J.P. is adorned with several buildings in the Classic style, and has a large obelisk, erected in memory of Robert Fox Lane esq. only son and heir of George (Fox-Lane), first and only baron Bingley of that name, and grandson of Robert (Benson), Lord Bingley; he died in 1769, during the lifetime of his father, on whose death in 1772 this title became extinct: in the chapel adjoining the ruins of the mansion, almost entirely consumed by fire on the 28 July, 1828, are some marble monuments to the ancestors of the family. Here are the kennels of the Bramham Moor foxhounds, of which James T. R. Lane-Fox esq. J.P. is master. Boston Spa, Harrogate, Tadcaster and Wetherby, are convenient places for hunting visitors. **Bowcliffe House**, now called Bramham Hall, the seat of James Thomas Richard Lane-Fox esq. D.L., J.P. stands on an eminence at the southern extremity of the village, and is a mansion in the Greek Classic style, comprising a centre and two wings, the entrance being surmounted by a pediment, supported by six pillars; the grounds are very tastefully laid out. **Hope Hall**, formerly the residence of Sir Thomas Fairfax, is also occupied by J. T. R. Lane-Fox esq. **Oglethorpe Hall**, now a farmhouse in the occupation of Messrs. Richard Wright and Son, is about a mile east from Bramham; this place was formerly the residence of the ancient family of Oglethorpe, one of whom was reeve of the county at the time of the Norman Conquest; they continued to reside here until the period of the Civil War, when, on account of their devotion to the Royal cause, their estates were confiscated by the Parliament. Major Fredk. Richard Thomas Trench-Gascoigne, of Lotherton Hall, is lord of the manor; James T. R. Lane-Fox esq. and Lord Headley are the principal landowners. The soil is light loam; subsoil, magnesian limestones and freestone. The chief crops are turnips, barley, wheat and oats. The population of the township in 1931 was 1,034; the area, 4,108 acres; rateable value, £5,704.

**BRAMHOPE** is a township and village in the parish of Otley, 1 mile south from the Pool station on the Leeds and Ilkley section of the North Eastern railway and  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles south-east from Otley, in the Otley division of the Riding, upper division of the wapentake of Skyrack, Otley petty sessional division and county court district, Wharfedale union, rural deanery of Otley and archdeaconry and diocese of Ripon. The North Eastern railway from Harrogate to Leeds passes under Bramhope moor by a tunnel 2 miles and 1 furlong in length.

The old church or chapel-of-ease, probably erected during the Protectorate, is a plain building of stone, with small western belfry containing one bell: the font dates from 1673: there are monuments in the church to the Rev. Robert Dyneley (1810) and Sarah his wife; John Silvester esq. of Bramhope (1781) and Elizabeth his wife (1801); James Driver esq. of Bramhope (1818) and Hannah his wife (1814); Christopher Smith esq. (1846) and his wife and daughter (1814-46); and to Captain William Rhodes, of the 19th Light Dragoons and of Bramhope Hall (1869): the church is not now used for divine service.

St. Giles's, Bramhope, is an ecclesiastical parish formed August 22nd, 1882: the church, erected in 1881 at a cost of £2,200, is an edifice of stone from the Otley Chevin quarries; in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave, north aisle, north porch and a belfry containing one bell: there are sittings for about 200. The register dates from the year 1881. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £156, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1898 by the Rev. Arthur Marwood Wilcox M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. A vicarage house was built in 1900, from plans by Mr. F. H. Hargrave, architect, of Ripon, the cost being defrayed from funds left by Mr. Robert Craven and from Queen Anne's

J.P. The trustees of the late John Lawson esq. James Rhodes esq. and Henry Fawcett esq. of Broadfield, are the principal landowners. The land is all freehold. The soil is sandy and in part clayey; the subsoil is rock. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and potatoes. The population in 1891 was 389; the area is 1,398 acres; rateable value, £5,749.

Many thanks for the book (cheque for £15 for the local charities is enclosed).

I enclose details of Ben Sykes's family (from the 1891 census), with extra details where I know them. The family had moved to 18 Wetherby Road by 1891. Ben was shown as a Commercial Traveller on his wedding certificate (April 1872), but as a Schoolmaster when my grandfather John Edgar was born (April 1874). Ben and his wife (Annie) started at Bramham at the beginning of June 1875 and Ben is still shown in the 1893 Kelley's Directory as being at Bramham. However, on my grandfather's wedding certificate, Ben is shown as a Clerk (January 1910). John Edgar's father-in-law was a School Attendance Officer (but from the wrong side of the Pennines)

My grandfather always complained that being the son of a schoolmaster was no fun, as you were always punished twice. He and the other boys liked to follow the Hunt, and if it passed the school they would all run after it. Hence he got a beating when he got home and another one with the rest of the boys the next day.

The Kelley's directory photocopy is about a third of the Bramham entry. I am awaiting the rest of it from my son, who found it in the Family History Centre in London.

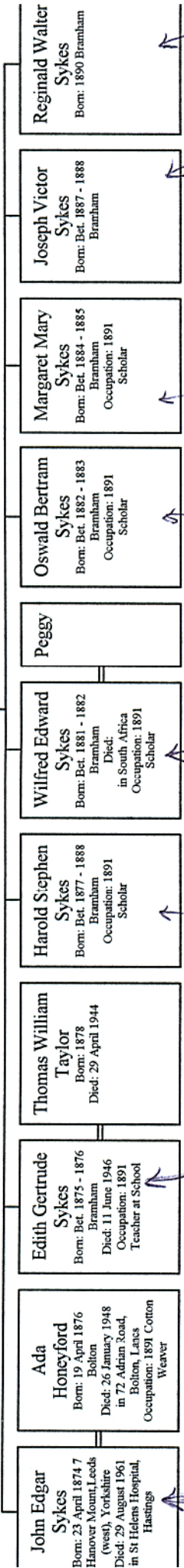
