Sergeant George Henry Dimmock	18 th August 1916	22	A former porter of the North East Railway.
Sapper George Duffield	Unknown	?	A former plumber.
Private John Robert Eastwood	23 rd November 1918.	55	Buried in Baghdad
Private Robert Edward Eastwood	16 th April 1918	21	A former plumber's apprentice. Son of the above.
Private Charles Firth	9 th October 1917	?	Possibly killed at Passchendaele.
Private Guy Sommerville Gibney	20 th July 1916	?	Killed in the battle of the Somme. Part of the Australian Imperial Force, formerly farmed in Australia
Private William Henry Hare	26 th October 1916	23	Formerly a farm labourer.

Private George Jakeman	18 th November 1916	34	Formerly a brewer's labourer. Had four children.
Private Edwin Jenkinson	24 th August 1918	35	A former farmer.
Private Joseph Kitchen	3 rd July 1918	37	A former gardener.
Private Mark Leckenby	3 rd May 1917	24	A former houseman at Whitwell House, Linton
Private Francis James Lester	24 th April 1917	34	A former butler to Major Lane-Fox, Bramham Park. Killed in 2 nd battle of The Scarpe, Arras
Private William Arthur Lock	21 st November 1916	31	A former painter, parents were of the Royal Oak, Aberford. Died of wounds in Newcastle and buried there.
Private Henry Edward Marriner	16 th September 1916	22	Killed in the battle for the Somme. A former houseboy.

Private Henry Maskell	27 th August 1917	26	Killed in the 3 rd battle of Ypres. Served at Gallipoli.

Private George Robert Nicholson	1 st August 1917	26	Killed in the 3 rd battle of Ypres.
Rifleman William Pallister	17 th April 1918	30	Died of wounds in a German hospital. Formerly a groom.
Private Ernest William Peacock	14 th July 1918	22	Formerly a gardener. Buried in Belgium.
Private Fred Poulter	1 st July 1916	33	A former wheelwright.
Lance Corporal Charles Ratcliffe	17 th December 1915	25	Killed at Passchendaele. Attached to a French Mortar Battery.

Sapper Frank Hardwick Smith	30 th March 1918	25	
Private William Stockdale	Unknown	?	Died in Wetherby of bronchitis aggravated by military service.
Private Arthur Edward Summersgill	15 th November 1916	28	Killed in the battle for the Somme
Private John Thompson	5 th November 1917	32	A former farm labourer
Fusilier Reginald Thompson	23 rd March 1918	?	A former barman
Private William Thompson	14 th September 1914	22	Brother of John (above). Killed in the 1 st battle of the Aisne. A former game keeper's assistant.
Lieutenant Edward Yeadon Wadeson	22 nd March 1918	22	Son of the Revd. Wadeson, Rector of Bramham. A Cambridge graduate.
Private Joe Walton	Unknown	?	
Private Edward Ward	Unknown	?	
Private Samuel Ware	25 th October 1916	?	
Sergeant Thomas Warrington	9 th May 1915	22	A former farm labourer/horseman. Killed in the 2 nd Battle of Ypres. Parents were of the Crooked Billet, Saxton
Private George Wigglesworth	15 th April 1918	22	A former gardener at Bramham Park.
Lance Sergeant C. Wilkinson	6 th May 1918	20	
Nurse Amelia Beatrice Wright	8 th January 1919	40	Died in East Leeds War Hospital
Private Osbourne Young	28 th April 1918	23	Served as an ambulance driver. A former grocer's assistant.
Rifleman William John Young	12 th July 1916	?	Buried in Hunslet Cemetery. A former farm worker.

Notes: The above information was compiled by a resident of Bramham who has since moved out of the Parish and passed the records across so that his research would not be lost. Space means that the above is necessarily a summary, additional columns showing regiment, relatives, where killed and where buried/commemorated have been omitted.

Trade in Service.

All the above were infantrymen except M. Cockshott (Cavalry), G. Duffield & F.E. Smith (Engineers), J.E. Eastwood (unknown), C. Firth (Driver), H.E. Marriner & J. Thompson (Gunners), A.B. Wright (Nurse), O. Young (Ambulance Driver) and E. Ward (Unknown but probably a driver).

Residency.

Address information shows that many of the above were resident in Bramham living on; Bramham Park estate, Back Street, Beaconsfield Terrace, Biggin Farm, Church Hill, Church Lane (Primrose

Cottages), Front Street, High Street, Tenter Hill (Walker's Buildings), Terry Lug, The Cragg, Willowgarth Cottage and at Wothersome (Stubbing Moor).
